"Do you not see that whatever goes into the mouth enters the stomach, and goes out into the sewer? But what comes out of the mouth proceeds from the heart, and this is what defiles. For out of the heart come evil intentions, murder, adultery, fornication, theft, false witness,

slander. These are what defile a person." (Matthew 15:17-20, NRSV)

On Saturday, August 12th, Charlottesville, Virginia was the scene of one of the worst examples of racism and bigotry in recent memory. The response from nearly everyone was quick and articulate in condemning these events for exactly what they were – hate speech and a hate crime; this was domestic terrorism; this was sin. During the time since this tragedy, I have listened to countless news stories, read many different perspectives in the news media, liberal and conservative. I have seen so many Facebook posts about individual outrage from various points of view. Depending on who you listen to, this is a political problem or it is a tolerance problem or it is an education problem. My view is that this represents a fundamental <u>moral</u> problem.

Our President has been widely criticized for his comments about this event. The consensus seems to be that his remarks were more political than moral and that he should have been clearer in his condemnation of the neo-Nazi, white supremacist, white nationalist movement that lies at the heart of the Charlottesville demonstrations. It is not my job to speak for the President and I cannot say what motivated his remarks or what considerations he included in his decision to say what he said. I have no doubt that the media will continue to analyze every angle of that weekend. There will be lots of political hubbub about such things as free speech; civil rights; the meaning of various laws; and the responsibility of law enforcement to keep people safe. These are important conversations and they need to take place. However, I believe that the fundamental moral issue at play here is far more important than any of the political conversations that may result. It is vital that our leaders cast a vision that accurately identifies that which is "evil" vs that which is "good." It is essential that our leaders make this moral distinction unambiguously clear.

Bigotry, racism, white supremacy, in all its forms is sin; it is sin against God and against humanity. There is no moral ambiguity here. Timothy Tennent, President of Asbury Theological Seminary, shared this: "The moral question was actually explicitly "named" when the President was asked, "Are your statements creating a moral equiva-

lency between the two sides?" On Saturday, and again on Tuesday, we got nothing but moral confusion. In fact, our President specifically stated, "I am not putting anybody on a moral plane." But, that, of course, is precisely what must be done in these type situations. There can be no moral ambiguity which creates any kind of equivalency between a neo-Nazi and a young woman who was exercising her freedom of speech. Neo-Nazis, White Supremacists, KKK, and associated groups espouse beliefs which are repugnant and obnoxious to the American cultural fabric. As Christians, we must also state that ideas espoused by neo-Nazi, KKK, and White Supremacists are ultimately an attack on God the Father as creator, who created all men and women, of every ethnicity, in his image, and all are equal bearers of his providence and mercy. It is an attack on God the Son who died for every person, of every race. It is also an attack on the Holy Spirit who indwells men and women with his divine presence and empowers us to participate with him as His ambassadors to a world in pain."

There are those who may say that pastors should keep their political opinion to themselves; much of the time, this is correct. However, as I said earlier, this is not about politics – it is about fundamental morality. It is my job to speak truth to power and to make sure that the message of Jesus Christ is clear. The United Methodist Book of Discipline states: "Therefore, we recognize racism as sin and affirm the ultimate and temporal worth of all persons. We rejoice in the gifts that particular ethnic histories and cultures bring to our total life. We commit as the Church to move beyond symbolic expressions and representative models that do not challenge unjust systems of power and access."

Unless you are genetically Native American, everyone reading this is in this country because of an ancestor who came here from somewhere else. There is no room for "white nationalism" in this country. The idea of a pure Caucasian race was the dream of Adolf Hitler, not of anyone who believes in the freedoms upon which this country was founded. We must not allow the ideals of a few misguided individuals, who profess to be Christians, overcome the true message of Jesus. Jesus was not a racist; he was born into a minority race. He had dark skin and would have been racially profiled by today's law enforcement. Racism can be subtle and take many forms. Please, be vigilant and guard against it. Please, speak up when you encounter it. Please, pray that God's will may done on earth.

All churches in the Oklahoma Annual Conference now have access to the Real Discipleship Survey online. This system, designed by Phil Maynard, offers a way for churches to survey their maturity on six dimensions of the discipleship journey. This service is offered to all OKUMC churches free of charge.

The survey measures: a life of worship, a life of hospitality, a life open to Jesus, a life of obeying Jesus, a life of service, and a life of generosity.

Upon taking the survey, participants discover if they are exploring, beginning, growing, or maturing in each of those categories.

- 1.) Sign Up: Visit: http://discipleshipsurvey.com/member.html and enter our conference code: PEACEJOY
- 2.) Create Account: In order to take the Real Discipleship Survey online you will need to enter an email address and create a secure password. Choose your District (COUNCIL OAK) and your church from the dropdown lists, fill out the email and password fields and then click the blue "Sign Up" button. Use the click here link on the next screen to continue. You can also access the survey by visiting http://discipleshipsurvey.com/memberlogin.html after creating your account.
- 3.) Log In: Enter the password and email address you provided in step 2 in order to log in.
- 4.) Choose Your Groups: We have chosen to measure the survey statistics both at the churchwide level and by individual church groups. Use the blue "Edit Profile" button to select the group(s) to which you belong. (ie: Church Council, Teachers/Leaders, etc.) Simply choose YES for those groups to which you belong.
- 5.) Take Survey: Take the Real Discipleship Survey by clicking the blue "Take Survey" button and then selecting the one box of each color that fits you best. After completing the survey use the blue "Submit Survey" button. Your results will be displayed for you at that time. You may also select to view additional information or have your results sent to your email account. You may use http://discipleshipsurvey.com/memberlogin.html to log in and view your results at any time. You will also be able to retake the survey at a later date in order to measure changes in your discipleship over time.
