"So God created [humankind] in His own image; He created [them] in the image of God; He created them male and female" (Genesis 1:27).

Dear friends in Christ, Humanity was created in the image of God and therefore every human is of infinite worth. In spite of this fact, human beings have found new and more horrible ways to

treat one another differently based on the most insignificant differences – the skin tone of one that may be different from another. That is really all we are talking about – skin tone. Since the beginning of time, human beings have existed with different shades of skin tone. These differences have never been responsible for intellectual ability, strength, or beauty. God created and all of Creation is worthy.

The term "race" as applied to people does not appear in the Bible. In fact, the word itself is of uncertain origin and does not occur in any language until about the sixteenth century. While the modern race problem has economic, political, and social implications, the difference between current practice and biblical truth shows it to be primarily a moral and spiritual problem. The Bible does not deal with the race problem as we know it in our time, but it gives some very important principles which can be applied to race relations. It seems that the founders of our nation recognized those principles:

"We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable rights, that among these are Life, Liberty and the pursuit of Happiness." (The Declaration of Independence)

And yet, there are many people in our nation who continue to support discrimination when it comes to granting basic human rights to people of color, people with whom we disagree, people who come to our country seeking refuge, and people whose religion is not ours.

Black History Month reminds us that human beings of many different skin colors have made enormous contributions to the health and growth of this nation and the world. It reminds us that the image we see in our mirror every morning does not represent the entire human race. It challenges us to stop looking at the surface image of each person we meet and, instead, look at the imago Dei – the image of God – that resides at the core of every human being created in the image of God. It convicts us with the realization that whenever we mistreat, ignore, abuse, or discriminate against any other human being we mistreat, ignore, abuse, and discriminate against God, in whose image that person was created.

I do not pretend to be an expert on the topic of race in America, nor do I imagine that I can ever fully understand what it is like to be treated differently simply because the color of my skin is different from yours. Nonetheless, I can speak with authority on the subject of God's love for all people and God's command that we love all people as God has loved us.

Black History Month, or National African American History Month, is an annual celebration of achievements by black Americans and a time for recognizing the central role of African Americans in U.S. history. It's not a bad idea and we need to celebrate. I wonder, though, if the greater need is to change the character and culture of our people so that we begin to realize that black history is American history and world history and church history and human history.

God has created each person with a unique set of fingerprints. Likewise, we are each as unique as snow-flakes. Nobody, regardless of skin tone, can be lumped into a group of people where everyone is the same... ever. We are simply too unique. God created us all in diversity; when will we accept ourselves as God made us and learn to love the rainbow that is the human race?

ORIGINS OF BLACK HISTORY MONTH

The story of Black History Month begins in 1915, half a century after the Thirteenth Amendment abolished slavery in the United States. That September, the Harvard-trained historian Carter G. Woodson and the prominent minister Jesse E. Moorland founded the Association for the Study of Negro Life and History (ASNLH), an organization dedicated to researching and promoting achievements by black Americans and other peoples of African descent. Known today as the Association for the Study of African American Life and History (ASALH), the group sponsored a national Negro History week in 1926, choosing the second week of February to coincide with the birthdays of Abraham Lincoln and Frederick Douglass. The event inspired schools and communities nationwide to organize local celebrations, establish history clubs and host performances and lectures.

In the decades that followed, mayors of cities across the country began issuing yearly proclamations recognizing Negro History Week. By the late 1960s, thanks in part to the Civil Rights Movement and a growing awareness of black identity, Negro History Week had evolved into Black History Month on many college campuses. President Gerald R. Ford officially recognized Black History Month in 1976, calling upon the public to "seize the opportunity to honor the too-often neglected accomplishments of black Americans in every area of endeavor throughout our history." Since then, every American president has designated February as Black History Month.



Fast-A-Meal for Restore Hope Ministries

From the earliest years of the church, faithful Christians have used the holy season of Lent (the 40 days between Ash Wednesday and Good Friday) as an opportunity to examine their lives, look at the suffering and sacrifice of Christ for us, and give sacrificially in response to that amazing grace. John Wesley, the founder of the Methodist movement, called Christians to fast, pray, and give alms as he believed the


combination of those elements is important for the growth of our faith.
