

*"At once the Spirit forced Jesus out into the wilderness. He was in the wilderness for forty days, tempted by Satan. He was among the wild animals, and the angels took care of him."* (Mark 1:12-13, CEB)

**Wednesday, February 18<sup>th</sup> is Ash Wednesday**, marking the beginning of the Season of Lent, a 40-day period which is an allusion to the separation of Jesus in the desert to fast and pray. While not specifically instituted in the Bible text, the 40-day period of repentance is also analogous to the 40 days during which Moses repented and fasted in response to the making of the Golden calf. (Jews today follow a 40-day period of repenting in preparation for and during the High Holy Days from Rosh Chodesh Elul to Yom Kippur.) The forty days of Lent are counted as the weekdays, excluding Sundays, between Ash Wednesday and Easter. This observance has been part of church tradition since the Fourth Century A.D.

I bring all this history up to say that, aside from the tradition and the ritual, Lent has an important role to play in our lives as Christian believers. Just as we spend time during Advent preparing ourselves to receive the newborn Christ, we must spend time preparing ourselves to understand the magnitude of Jesus' sacrifice – his passion and death; and the full importance of his resurrection. These are not simple concepts for us to comprehend and we need time to pray and listen for God's voice. Church tradition calls for us to spend time seriously considering the state of our own lives; to examine our own sinfulness and to repent. It is a time to ask forgiveness and to listen for God leading us away from the things that tempt us to sin. It is a time for us to re-examine our Christian life and seek to strengthen our relationship with God in Jesus Christ. Lent is actually not much different from the life God calls us to each day; it is simply a time when we should concentrate on becoming who God wants us to become and striving to implement what we discover during Lent each day after Easter Sunday.

The four weeks prior to Lent this year we have spent talking about how prayer makes a real difference in our lives. This has been an intentional effort to guide us toward a more powerful prayer life so that we are better prepared for the Season of Lent. During Lent we will have the **"Praying Backwards"** series to give you a chance to study practical ways to offer prayer to God. We will also have a contemplative **Prayer Walk**

available every day in **Fellowship Hall**. This guided walk offers stations where you may spend time with God in prayer and further develop that peace we cannot explain that I talked about this past Sunday morning. Our children and youth have been busy making **prayer beads** for each person attending worship on Sunday, February 22<sup>nd</sup>, the first Sunday in Lent. This is another method of helping us to focus on prayer and avoid distractions when we are in conversation with God. There will also be several opportunities to gather with fellow believers from across Sand Springs as we once again celebrate **"Tuesdays in Lent"** with our sisters and brothers in Christ. (There is more information about this event in this newsletter.)

There are many other ways that Christians have traditionally marked the Season of Lent. Prayer is certainly of vital importance, but **fasting** is also a widely observed practice. Depriving ourselves of things that we desire as we seek to know God better reminds us of the sacrifice of Jesus. It also demonstrates for us the relative importance of material comforts in our lives and helps us to better appreciate the things that God wants us to count as important. If fasting is not possible for you, then consider **taking** something up rather than **giving** something up. Take up a new habit of giving, or a new prayer discipline, or a new Scripture reading schedule. Begin something new this Lent that will help you grow spiritually. Remember that this is a season of preparation; we are preparing ourselves to know God completely through the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus.

I hope you will plan to join us for **Ash Wednesday worship at 6:30 p.m. on February 18<sup>th</sup>**. Together we will begin the season by reminding ourselves of our own mortality and the eternal immortality promised to us by God. This will be the start of a season where we will walk together along the road the Jesus leads us. We will encounter **"The Rebel Jesus"** as we explore the **"Renegade Gospel"** each Sunday during Lent. Then, as we approach Easter Sunday, we will celebrate our annual **Maundy Thursday** supper, **Good Friday** worship and the glory of **Resurrection Sunday**, beginning with Sunrise Service on April 5<sup>th</sup>.

*"Blow the trumpet in Zion; sound the alarm on my holy hill. Let all who live in the land tremble, for the day of the LORD is coming. It is close at hand."* (Joel 2:1)

### Praying at Noon for Daily Bread

Noontime doesn't need to mean only taking time for a quick sandwich. You are invited to participate in a daily prayer initiative. Originally founded as "Pray

Down at Noon" by a Houston, Texas pastor, this initiative is spreading throughout the country as a way to remind all of us of the need to pray regularly. The idea is to set the alarm on your cellphone to go off at 12:00 Noon each day as a reminder to pray The Lord's Prayer. Imagine the sound of all those alarms going off at the same time every day and the thrill of knowing that people all over our community are praying at the same time.

Christians have prayed this simple, yet profound prayer for centuries. This powerful initiative can be a point of unity for all of us across denominations to bridge the divides of doctrine and polity that seem so evident in Christ's Body. As this initiative spreads, more and more people of every denomination are participating and creating an enormous chain of prayers that begins at noon each day, regardless of time zone. We are also inviting all other Sand Springs churches to participate. Once this habit is formed, it is an easy practice to maintain for a lifetime.

## NEW DISTRICT NAME CHOSEN

Welcome to the **Council Oak District** of the Oklahoma Conference of the United Methodist Church. The District Transition Team for the extended Tulsa metropolitan area has chosen **Council Oak** as the name for the new District that will come into being on **June 1, 2015**.

It was no easy task to select a name and several names were proposed. Slowly, "Council Oak" rose to the top. The name "Council Oak" comes from the story of the settlement of the Creek Indians in the Tulsa area. I thought it respectful if we would first ask how the Native American community felt about us using that name. I contacted David Wilson and Margaret Johnson of the OIMC. They were both honored and excited about the name but felt that since they were neither one Creek, they should check with persons on the Creek Council. Chuck Horton, pastor at Owasso and a member of our Transition Team, also had a relative who works for the Creek Council and checked with them. David Wilson eventually talked with Chief Tiger who felt very positive about the idea.

As United Methodists we are in a Quadrennium of Repentance in hopes of bringing healing and reconciliation with indigenous people. In conversation with Bishop Hayes, it was our hope that taking this name for our District would be a step in the direction of that healing and reconciliation. It will give us the opportunity to know and tell this story so important to our part of the state.

## The Council Oak

In 1836 the Lochapoka Creek Indians settled in this area following their involuntary migration from Alabama. Tulsa comes from the Creek word *tallasi* meaning old town. They brought with them over the trail, ashes and embers from their last fires in Alabama using embers to build a fire each night. They marked their arrival with a solemn ceremony on a hill overlooking the River near what is now downtown Tulsa. From this site, they could see the plains around them. They gathered beneath a large oak tree and deposited the ashes they had carried with them. The Council fire was burning from the flames of their homeland. It was the beginning of a new life in a new land. For many years, they gathered in this spot for ceremonies, feasts, and games. Today this site is marked with a flame sculpture and is listed in the National Register of Historic Places.

This name combines the historical tradition of the area with the geography. It is also a reminder that we are a people who function in councils and confer-

ences. We are also a people on a journey carrying with us the fire of the Holy Spirit.

*Rise up, walk through the length and breadth of the land, for I will give it to you. So Abram moved his tent and came and settled by the oaks of Mamre... and there he built an altar to the Lord. (Genesis 13:17-18)*

*The Lord appeared to Abraham by the oaks of Mamre, as he sat at the entrance of his tent in the heat of the day. (Genesis 18:1)*

*The spirit of the Lord GOD is upon me, because the LORD has anointed me; he has sent me to bring good news to the oppressed, to bind up the brokenhearted, to proclaim liberty to the captives, and release to the prisoners; to proclaim the year of the LORD's favor, and the day of vengeance of our God; to comfort all who mourn; to provide for those who mourn in Zion—to give them a garland instead of ashes, the oil of gladness instead of mourning, the mantle of praise instead of a faint spirit. They will be called **oaks of righteousness**, the planting of the LORD, to display his glory. (Isaiah 61:1-3)*

Anyone is welcome to join us for supper and nobody will be turned away. We are suggesting a donation of \$1.00 per person for the dinner, but anyone is welcome whether or not they can afford to contribute. The idea is to help our neighbors get a good meal and introduce them to our community of Christian fellowship.

This event will take place on the **4<sup>th</sup> Monday of every month at 5:30 p.m.** in our **Fellowship Hall** downstairs. We will be inviting our neighbors through signage and word-of-mouth, as well as through Sand Springs Community Services and the Sand Springs Senior Citizen Center. Our prayerful hope is that you, the members of our church, will also plan to join us for supper and that you will spend time meeting and getting to know our guests. This is not just another opportunity for us to have fellowship with one another; this is an intentional effort to meet new people who live in our community.

We are asking that, in addition to your presence at the meal, you provide corn bread and desserts each month. Since a charitable gift annuity is a combination of a gift to charity and an annuity, Katherine’s church will benefit from the charitable gift portion upon her death.
