Jesus answered, "I am the way, the truth, and the life. No one comes to the Father except through me." (John 14:6, CEB)

When Jesus spoke these words he did not intend to establish an exclusive club or an organization that excluded people. Instead,

Jesus intended to reveal the fullness of God through his own example of grace, mercy, forgiveness, and love. This revelation through the life of Jesus was manifest in those moments when Jesus welcomed sinners to dine with him; when he healed the broken, even on the Sabbath; when he challenged the mob to cast the first stone; and when he broke all the rules in favor of God's law to love one another. Jesus was a rebel, a revolutionary, a "trouble-maker". He was clearly anti-establishment and anti-status quo. He stood against the political and religious establishment to show us that God's kingdom is not of this world and, if we are to live in God's kingdom, we must learn to live a very different life from what our culture demonstrates for us.

This week we began our series, "**Renegade Gospel: Discovering the Rebel Jesus.**" It is based on the book by Rev. Mike Slaughter, pastor of Ginghamburg United Methodist Church in Ohio. We are approaching this in a different way than we normally do in Sunday worship. That is because I believe the message from this book is challenging us to behave very differently in our everyday life. The method may be uncomfortable for us – that's the idea; you see, Pastor Mike says we are called to, "**afflict the comfortable and comfort the afflicted.**" Maybe if we are a little uncomfortable from time-to-time we will better recognize where Jesus really wants us to be.

I also want to be very clear that some of the things that Mike Slaughter presents in his book are challenging, even controversial. I do not imagine or even intend for everyone in our church to agree with everything Pastor Mike has to say. We are Methodists – there is plenty of room for discussion and differences of opinion in our church. I am certain there are times when we do not all agree on everything. Disagreement in conversation is fine, as long as we do not become disagreeable.

As we continue to go through the Season of Lent I want us to all engage in the conversation about Jesus as a **revolutionary in his time who calls us to be revolutionaries in our time.** It is revolutionary to suggest that we should no longer think of justice in terms of "*an eye for an eye,*" but rather in terms of "*turn the other cheek.*" How does this affect our understanding of the way the criminal justice system in America works? How does this affect our own ability to tolerate and respond to people who might offend us in one way or another? Does this suggest that Jesus was a "pacifist"? What happens when you also include Jesus' mandate to "*love your enemies*" in this conversation. This is a very complex arena for prayerful conversation. There are no

easy answers to these questions and there are plenty of other questions to be asked. That is what makes Jesus' teaching revolutionary – it calls us to question what we thought we already had clear answers for and it challenges us to engage differing opinions in respectful discourse.

Each week we will encounter a new set of questions that challenge us to engage a Jesus we may not be familiar with or a man we may have forgotten through the years. It may be difficult for us to imagine that the Jesus we met in Sunday school may not be the same Jesus who actually walked the earth and taught his followers to stand against the government and their culture. I get that; this book challenges me as well. I cannot tell you that I agree with everything Mike Slaughter presents in this study. I can tell you that it is not my opinion that matters in this conversation – this is for you to decide how you feel about these issues and how you believe God is calling you to transform your life because of what you believe about Jesus Christ. What I think does not matter here – you need to be clear about what you believe. As someone said in worship on Sunday, *if we cannot be clear about what we believe, how can we ever hope to offer a faithful witness to anyone else?* We cannot talk about what we do not know about.

Rev. Slaughter says this in the introduction to his book: "*The Lenten season is a sobering reminder that the journey with Jesus leads to a cross. Jesus reminded the crowds that showed up motivated by self-interest, miracles of healing, and free food to count the cost of discipleship (Luke 14:25-33). He concluded by saying, 'In the same way, those of you who do not give up everything you have cannot be my disciples' (verse 33.)*" (Slaughter, page 13)

This message still applies to the church in this century. If we treat church simply as a place where we go to feel better about ourselves, to witness what God might be doing for somebody else, and to enjoy a few pot luck suppers, then we are missing the fullness of the revelation of God in Jesus Christ. The church exists for so much more than just nurturing and caring for its members; that is vitally important, but it is not our true purpose. The church exists to bear witness to the world that our Jesus welcomes, loves, and forgives anyone and everyone who seek him. He challenges us – the members of His Body – to act in that same manner towards everyone we meet. Walk with us on this Lenten journey as we discover new ways to engage the world in the Name of Jesus Christ.

This is an **all-church event** and we need everyone's help to keep it going into the future. The important thing is that this is a chance for us to be the church by showing God's love. 
