

Have you ever noticed how many times the Psalms say something about some kind of adversary? The word "enemy" seems to show up time and time again. It is important to remember that

when something repeats in the Bible, it is often because the author is trying to tell us that this is something important.

Most of the Psalms are attributed to David, and he was certainly a person who had a lot of enemies. David was the warrior, the conqueror, the defender. When I think what David must have been singing about, I think of Philistines and Moabites. David also had enemies from within the Kingdom of Israel. I think of David's long enmity with Saul, and then later the war he fought with his own son, Absalom.

When we think of who "the enemy" is in the Psalms, I am sure that these are the sort of people that David had in mind. However, we know that poetry can often have more than just its literal meaning. When we read or sing the Psalms, it evokes imagery beyond some long-dead people groups or the Biblical characters of old.

When I read the Psalms in 2020, I see the enemy not as an army or a political rival, but I see the more existential enemy of Coronavirus. That is the enemy that is foremost on my mind today. So when I read Psalm 23 where it says, "You prepare a table before me / in the presence of my enemies; / you anoint my head with oil; / my cup overflows," I think of God's care for us in the presence of Coronavirus.

Thanksgiving is soon approaching, and it promises to be a very "2020" Thanksgiving. No doubt for most of us it will be like no Thanksgiving we have ever celebrated before. As we sit down to eat at our much smaller tables this year, remember that the table is prepared in the presence of our enemy. God anoints, our cups overflow. God is with us, even as the enemy surrounds us. And the enemy will not be victorious.

So let us all keep up the good fight against this enemy. Let us all do our part in the war against Coronavirus. Let us not give in to anxiety or disappointment as many of our holiday traditions are disrupted. Instead let us remember the words of David: "Surely goodness and mercy shall follow me / all the days of my life, / and I shall dwell in the house of the LORD / my whole life long."

It is time once again to start thinking about Thanksgiving! This year is going to be a little different than years past, what with the pandemic and all, but we still want to be able to serve and love our neighbors.

This year we are going to primarily need help with deliveries. We are planning on delivering in more of a Doordash/Grubhub kind of style, leaving the food on the porch rather than handing the food over directly. If you or your parishioners at your churches would like to help us with deliveries, please come to The Well (101 W. 38th St.) at 10 AM. Please do not come into the building unless asked to do so. We are going to try to limit the number of people inside the building and do as much as we can outside. Please bring a mask and practice safe social distancing procedures. We will hand off the food and give you instructions on where to deliver.

If you would like to drop off food, please do so at the same location on the day before Thanksgiving between 9 AM and 6 PM. We are going to try to have as much as the food as possible cooked by our restaurant partners for added safety, but as usual we are going to need pies. **Pre-packaged store-bought pies will be our preference this year**, again, for the sake of being as safe as possible.
