



Yea, though I walk through the valley of the shadow of death, I will fear no evil: for thou art with me; thy rod and thy staff they comfort me. — Psalm 23:4

A few years ago, I had the tremendous privilege of traveling to Israel and Palestine on a pil-grimage trip of the Holy Land. The pastor organizing the trip told us before we went that two things would happen: "You will never read the Bible again the same way, and you'll never read the newspaper again the same way." I found both of those things to be accurate.

For example, it is difficult for me to read the 23rd Psalm now without thinking of standing at the top of a mountain in the Judean hills overlooking the *Wadi Qelt*, the valley that many scholars believe inspired David to write about the "valley of the shadow of death." This is a valley that, throughout history, has had quite the troubled reputation. It is full of rocky outcroppings, caves, and blind turns that makes it a great place for highwaymen to lay in wait for travelers and attack them on their way.

It was a dangerous valley in the time of David, and it continued to be dangerous even until the time of Jesus who uses the very same valley as the setting for his story of the Good Samaritan. The road from Jerusalem to Jericho lies along the bottom of the valley, and most people wouldn't dare travel it alone or at night. In the 5th century Christians built St. George's Monastery into the cliffside of the valley as a place where travelers could stop and rest for the night so as not to be caught out on the road after dark. For a thousand years this valley was an incredibly fearsome place.

I think about what is must have been like for someone traveling down that road. To not know if danger in the form of a wild animal or a wild human being might be lurking around every corner. To look suspiciously at every cave opening and every rock and wonder if you will make it past. This is the valley, where danger waits around every nook and cranny, where David says, "I will fear no evil: for thou art with me."

Today we walk a dangerous road. Today our enemy remains unseen but waits around every corner: isolation, anxiety, grief, and of course "the virus." As we walk down this dangerous road, let us remember (as David did) that God is with us. It is for this reason that we do not

need to live in fear. It's not that the danger isn't real (it is) and it's not that we don't have to walk the road to Jerusalem (we do). Our strength is in the Lord who walks with us. So, while we must all walk this dangerous path today, we trust that we do not walk it alone. And if God is for us, who can be against us?
