





"Seeing the Image of God"

"It's a great day for America, everybody!"

That's how Craig Ferguson started every show when he hosted the Late Late Show for ten years. As late night talk shows go Ferguson's was always a little different in that it was more improvisational and always felt a little lower budget, especially compared to its current iteration hosted by James Corden. I always appreciated Ferguson as a host because he

always seemed incredibly honest while delivering his monologue.

On one particular show in February of 2007 Ferguson gave one of his famously honest monologues on an event that happened over the weekend: the very public mental breakdown of pop music star Britney Spears. This clip of his monologue from this show has been making the rounds lately with the recent release of the documentary, Framing Britney Spears.

In the clip, Ferguson talks about how he has, in many ways up to that point, made a living by making fun of people. He talks about how he had made fun of an actor on the show, but then met that actor in person not long afterwards and how the actor was nice to him in spite of the mean things that he had said about the actor. Ferguson talks about how this experience has caused him to rethink how he does things on the show. "At what price am I doing this stuff?" he asks himself. "I wanna' be able to be funny, but [also] I wanna' be able to get some sleep!"

"I think my aims been off a bit recently, I want to change a bit, and so tonight: no Britney Spears jokes." Ferguson goes on to talk about how, that very same weekend, he was 15 years sober. He talks about his own struggles with alcoholism and his own mental breakdowns. The real difference between Craig Ferguson and Britney Spears? At the time of Ferguson's struggles he wasn't famous and there weren't any cameras pointed at him.

"This woman has 2 kids, she's 25 years old, she's a baby herself," he says. In that moment, the person that was the butt of the joke seemed much more like a human being that really, genuinely, needed help from people who loved her. Ferguson points to us a problem that should be very apparent to us as Christians: people should not be treated like objects. People should be treated like people, because people are made in God's own image.

When Jesus tells us in Matthew 7:12, "Do to others whatever you would like them to do to you. This is the essence of all that is taught in the law and the prophets," he is telling us that the heart of Christian ethics is having empathy for other human beings. It means seeing the image of God in others. It means weeping when others struggle with sin and brokenness.

As we are (God willing!) approaching the end of the pandemic, I want to encourage you (and myself, for that matter) to think about how we can better treat people like people and not like objects. I want to encourage you (and myself!) to better see the image of God in others.
