In the early 90s I remember my dad telling me about this really cool and interesting thing that people were doing with computers called "the internet." It wasn't much later that this mystical "internet" became a reality. For a kid living in the woods of southeast Oklahoma, it felt like the world was at my fingertips for the first time.

We have come a long way since those early days. The internet is faster and easier to access than ever before. It is no longer a novelty, but in many ways a necessity. It is now difficult to go to school or get a job without the internet. Many of you are reading this very article because you received it in your email.

The internet is, like so many other things, a tool that can be used for many different purposes. Some of those purposes are good (like, say, streaming a worship service!). However, we are quickly discovering that in many ways the internet can be used for things that are not so good. We have the world's information at our fingertips, but it can be difficult to discern in the deluge what information is good and useful and what information is inaccurate or harmful.

Many people are now reconsidering the usefulness of social media. Social media, like the internet itself, was originally intended to bring people together. In many ways it does! (Did I mention you can find our services on Facebook and YouTube?) However, sociologists are beginning the see the ways in which social media is now trending towards being harmful to people.

Social media thrives on something called "engagement," that is, people interacting with the site and each other. The companies that own these platforms (Facebook, Twitter, etc.) have discovered that controversy, conflicts, and outrage are the things that drive engagement the most. Because they have learned this, they have now designed these platforms to focus on these things. They want you to see things that make you upset, because then you are more likely to engage. Their business is outrage.

While this is very good for driving engagement on these platforms and, as a result, increasing the profits of these companies, it is quite bad for normal people like you and me. God didn't create us to be angry all the time. God doesn't want us to be angry all the time. Our God is a God of peace.
